## Serious Problem of Zbigniew Boleslaw (Zbyszek) Jaszczolt

Zbigniew Jaszczolt was the only Polish person who was ever arrested in 1947 by the Polish Embassy in Beirut, Lebanon – and the only Polish person who was expelled by the Polish Embassy in Beirut, Lebanon (17 May 1947).

The 2017 year is the 70<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Zbigniew Boleslaw (Zbyszek) Jaszczolt, being the only Polish man expelled from Beirut (Lebanon) by the Polish Embassy. In 1946 at the age of 25, Jaszczolt arrived in Beirut and claimed to be a Lieutenant of the Polish Army which was still based after the end of the war in Northern Italy.

Whilst in Beirut, Jaszczolt also claimed to be the Head of the Polish Army's Middle Eastern Secret Service during WW2 which the Polish Embassy in Beirut did not accept him in 1946 as the Head of Secret Service for the Middle East – as Polish Embassy has their own Head of Middle Eastern Secret Service and not the Polish Army in the near Middle East.

Not being intelligent, this was Jaszczolt's unbearable and an extremely appalling lie, as he was nothing of the sort - he possessed absolutely none of the qualities expected in an intelligence officer – discretion, subtlety, intellect, ruthlessness.

In reality, Jaszczolt played no role in any meaningful capacity as a counter-intelligence officer but privately, he eventually informed at his arrest that he was only involved mainly in smuggling contraband goods in order to make finance (coffee, cigars, alcohol, diamonds, clothes, etc).

Jaszczolt also attended one of the universities in Beirut "Academie Libanaise des Beaux Arts de Beyrouth (ALBA)" – but was expelled after 1 term in the first year (December 1946), as he was not intellectually intelligent, very lazy and totally failing in French as well as all Architecture studies and exams.

Zbigniew Jaszczolt was also responsible for the abduction and rape of many young Polish women (at least 9 rapes), especially Polish girls at the largest University in Beirut, "Universite Saint-Joseph de Beyrouth (USJ)" He was seen as a-low ranking, naïve & selfish, and a very abrasive rapist by the Polish Embassy staff.

One of his targets was Eleonora Lenkiewicz, the Head of Polish Students Union at Beirut University – he apparently told her during a lunch to drop out of her "Universite Saint-Joseph de Beyrouth (USJ)", and go with him back to Italy. Eleonora walked out of lunch without finishing her meal and refused to see him again.

At the decision of the Polish Ambassador Zygmunt Zawadowski in Beirut, Jaszczolt was arrested in 15 May 1947 by Leszek Rencki, the Polish Embassy's Head of Polish Intelligence who was responsible for the Intelligence of Middle East.

Jaszczolt broke down within 1 hour during his arrest and confessed that his intentions in Lebanon were not really related to counter-intelligence but rather to make a profit for the Polish Army and especially for himself – and he also mentioned that "Polish ladies in Beirut enjoyed sex".

The Polish Ambassador Zygmunt Zawadowski personally informed Jaszczolt that he would be officially expelled from Lebanon within 48 hours of his arrest, mainly due to his rape of Polish women.

The Lebanese Foreign Minister & Head of Secret Service – Joseph Harfouche – agreed with Zygmunt Zawadowski and personally confirmed the expulsion of Jaszczolt from Lebanon.

Ironically, Jaszczolt – who attended the dreadful "Polish University College" in London (which failed as a temporary University 1947-1953 and was closed in 1953) - did not attend any real University in the UK and also failed to become an Architect – spent the rest of his life working for architects as a very low-level clerk in London.

Nevertheless, he lied and later claimed for many years whilst living in Ealing that he was the "Head of Polish Intelligence" in the Middle East during and after the war, even though he was only 18 when the war started in September 1939 (being born on 17 May 1921), being arrested and prisoned by NKWD in Russia between 1939-1941 and was only 25 when he arrived @ Beirut in 1946 – and expelled from Lebanon near at his 26<sup>th</sup> birthday (17 May 1947).

In reality, he was the most hated man in London's Polish community, especially in Ealing where numerous Polish people were attacked & paranoid by Jaszczolt at every Annual General Meeting at Polish Ealing.

A most senior well-known Polish Banker - Andrzej Ostaszewski - who was also the privileged Head of Audit at the Polish Ealing section of Finance for 3x for 3 years = 9 years — was attacked regularly every year during the annual official meeting by Jaszczolt (who was not educated and did not understand Finance), and therefore this Polish Banker (who worked delightfully & unpaid for the Polish section) and all his 3 Polish Ealing Audit colleagues were so upset at Jaszczolt that they all resigned together from the Polish Ealing Audit in early 1990s due to the selfish incompetence of Jaszczolt.

Ironically, many people who attended Zbigniew Jaszczolt's funeral @ Bobola Church @ 1.30pm on 30 Wednesday March 2005 – followed by celebrate lunch @ POSK - were there to celebrate his death (17 March 2005, aged 83) as he was the most hated man in Polish community in London.

Which is why Zbigniew Boleslaw Jaszczolt was the only Polish person who was expelled by the Polish Embassy in Beirut, Lebanon.
